



Another well-known hotel was the Old Oak Hotel on the north side of East Main Street, just east of Case Avenue. A favored stop for travelers, it was famous for its good food. This was a private home until 1895, when Mr. Link purchased it and converted it into a hotel-restaurant. A fire destroyed this building on September 27, 1950. A large hundred-year old oak in front of the hotel survived the fire, but was cut down in later years.

Leo's Inn stood opposite the West Lake on the spot now occupied by Felice's catering hall. It was O.H. Perry's home until 1900 and was then made into a restaurant. First known as the West Lake Inn, it later became Leo's Inn, and was finally named the Continental Inn. The inn burned down on May 20, 1941.



The Pine Grove Inn located in East Patchogue, originated shortly after 1900 in an idyllic location on Swan River, just off Pine Neck Avenue. The inn emphasized a rustic appearance in a country setting. Today, although changed in appearance, it is still a restaurant, well known for its good food.
