



Johnson's Grocery Store on the southeast corner of South Ocean Avenue and Terry Street in 1908. This building replaced Dr. Foster's first home. The structure was known as the Johnson Building but later was referred to as the Usher Building. In July 1917, the post office moved here from the Syndicate Building and stayed until the new post office was ready on Main Street.
