



Most of the property on East Main Street opposite Rider Avenue belonged to the Rose family, who had two houses there. Some of the property was sold at the turn of the century and a new road was built, called Rose Avenue. This is the Walter S. Rose home between the Jaycox and Seward Smith homes.



The the first Elks Club building on the northeast corner of East Main Street and Maple Avenue. This home was built c. 1870 as the Howell residence. It had several other owners, including a Latin School, before it became the Elks Club. When the Elks decided to build a new clubhouse on this spot, this building was moved to the southeast corner of West Main Street and West Avenue, where it served as an apartment house.



Dr. Agate Foster's first home on South Ocean Avenue stood on the southeast corner of Terry Street and Ocean Avenue. This picture was taken c. 1890. Later the Johnson store, also called the Usher Building, was built on this corner.
